THE QNE LAW of OPEN SPACE

The law of two feet or two wheels



If people find themselves in situations where they are neither learning anything nor contributing, they are responsible for moving to another place—using their two feet or wheels to find a place where their participation is more meaningful.

The Three Roles in Open Space

Bumblebees:



Take the law of two feet seriously, and by example, encourage movement, crosspollinating ideas/questions between groups. Ideas are carried from one group to the next to create new ideas.

The Three Roles in Open Space

Butterflies:

Bring the power of observation, silence and new ideas to the group. Not everyone joins the groups in Open Space, some flutter in the other Open Space and form a group of one to contemplate the ideas generated from the agenda. Moreover, leading and/or contributing is not defined as talking (only) within Open Space gatherings.

The Three Roles in Open Space

<u>Turtles:</u>



Rather than moving between conversations, or reflecting on their own, they find comfort in following their one main passion and remaining with that conversation for the entire session. They often add a consistent and grounded energy to the dynamic of the day.

The Role of Open Space Leaders

- 1. Extend Invitation
- 2. Select Location
- 3. Document What Emerges
- 4. Return Harvest Sheets

Next Steps in Open Space

- 1. Leaders go and stand by topic to gauge how many people are attending your conversation.
- 1. Other participants shop around to see what conversation is "calling them" to participate and mark your name on the topic page.
- 2. Leaders then go over to the agenda matrix to select a location for your conversation based on the # of participants and post your conversation topic under the location slot.
- 3. Lead your group to pick up lunch and head to your location to dive in...
